

TRIBUNAL IN HAGUE

ONLY TWO FUGITIVES REMAIN AT LARGE



The arrest of Radovan Karadžić was an important event for the International Criminal Tribunal for former Yugoslavia and international justice. After having avoided justice for 13 years, the man who is allegedly responsible for the most serious crimes committed in Bosnia and Herzegovina will finally be facing his charges before a court of law.

Only two fugitives now remain at large: the former commander of the Army of the Republic of Srpska Ratko Mladić, charged with genocide and other crimes allegedly committed in Bosnia and Herzegovina between 1992 and 1995 and Goran Hadžić, former President of the Republic of Srpska Krajina, charged with crimes against non-Serbian population in Eastern Slavonia in 1991 and 1992. Serbia must do everything in its power to locate, arrest and surrender these two.

It is actually an amazing feat of international justice that only two out of 161 persons charged before the Tribunal remain at large. The proceedings against 159 indictees are either completed or underway. Who are they?

For readers of "Justice in Transition" journal, we publish in this issue the names of all the ICTY indictees, including the information on the current status of their respective cases or the outcome of their trials. This may motivate the readers to look for more information about their cases: details of the indictment, facts established during the trial, reasoning of judgments etc.
